The Green Economy

Investments in green technology have grown 94% over the past 2 years, which represents 31% of the total U.S. investments in the green industries. Local 26 along with other mechanical and electrical trade unions have formed a coalition with the Sound Alliance to secure this work for our members. Transforming our workforce into piping careers that address these critical careers are necessary to lead our state and country out of this recession. Energy, water, heat and air usage in new and existing buildings is at the heart of this “green” movement. Not only are these issues going to be vital to our local members and contractors for decades to come, they will address the

greater problem of decreasing the global climate crisis.

The United States Green Building Council (USGBC), a group of over 15,000 companies and organizations in the construction industry dedicated to the development of green building technology and the UA is at the forefront.

Local 26 Master Agreement Contract Negotiations

In the most recent round of negotiations your negotiation committee brought forward an offer with a recommendation. The contract vote will take place on Monday, July 27th from 6:00-8:00 p.m. I urge the membership to be pro-active and vote.

Your negotiation committee, led by Business Manager Phil Dines, was faced with unprece-

ded economic times, record un-employment rates, recession and all out job cancellations. “The economic climate is far different than it was a year ago”, said Dines. Construction spending was at a record high and locals were competing amongst themselves for the availability of manpower. We had two years of work on the books and then everything stopped with the

financial collapse of the stock market in Sep-Oct of 2008. At the same time, negotiating a contract for the entire jurisdiction that was mutually beneficial to both labor / management without going backwards or to zone pay for those members who live and work in a particular zone was a must. Serious questions had to be addressed.

NEGOTIATIONS CONT...

Are we escalating wages and promoting craftsmanship in proportion to each geographical area? Are our local 26 contractors being able to remain competitive?

As of this writing, many of these speculations have been answered. Local 32's recent contract has put them at an estimated 23% loss in man-hours year to date and predicted to be even higher by year end. We have lost contractors, and counties in the prevailing wage sector and even lost ground in the industrial pulp mills to non-union contractors, where we pre-

vailed for decades.

Given the light of our economic climate a steep escalation of labor rates would not be beneficial to the local members or our contractors who employ union members on a local wide basis. A collaborative agreement was reached on Thursday, July 26th to be put forth for a vote.

At the end of the day, we as union members are only successful to the extent that our members are working. In order for our contractors to be successful selling union labor, they must remain competitive in both the public and private sectors. It truly is a partnership, one that cannot function without the other.

UNION CLASSES

Suggested Unionism Courses may include: Heritage, Collective Bargaining, Stewardship, Leadership/ Foreman training, Construction Orientation Management Education Training (Comet).

Plumbing CEU's: Plumbing Code, Electrical Code, Water Systems, Pumps, C-Stop, First Aid/CPR, Industrial Hygiene, Medical Gas Certification, Green Plumbing. Washington State requires 16 hours of continuing education per Plumbing license renewal every two years. [Your Plumbing license expires on your Birthday.](#)

Steamfitter/ Welder Recommended Classes: Steam Systems, Hydraulic Heating, Related Mathematics, Layout, Auto-Cad, Detailing, Tube Bending, Rigging Certifications including proper signaling.

Welders: UA Certifications and upgrades. There are several UA locals that will not let you sign the O/W list without UA Certifications. By possessing certifications your not only taking pride in your craft, but are securing your position for employment purposes.

WELDER SHORTAGE REQUIRES NEW THINKING

The average welder in the United States is 54 years old. The baby boomer generation is causing a spike in the number retiring and unfortunately, there are far fewer younger people coming in to replace them. The prediction is that if this trend continues, there could be a shortage of 200,000 skilled workers by 2010— unless something is done now.

The UA has always been at the forefront of innovative ways for recruitment. The 16 week training course and the VIP program initiated here in local 26 are only the start. There is plenty of room for advancement that simply cannot be outsourced. Skilled welders can become welding inspectors, quality control technicians, instructors or fabricators. UA members have the opportunity to advance their educations by obtaining additional certifications nationally at any UA authorized training facility.

What more is needed? While working with representatives, and serving on the Workforce Development Council, I learned that many of the high school students often look at two year technical based colleges or a specified trade school. Why the sudden increase in these sectors verses a four year degree? Simple, with escalating college tuition rates and an increasing number of those graduating without specific skills that will help them land a good paying job. Many are turning to the trades to learn a meaningful and high paying career with long-term potential without the threat of outsourcing. No other training agency compares to organized labor's apprenticeship programs.

Those that control the welders, will control the market in the pipefitting industry....

LOCAL 26 ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP & FAMILY PICNIC

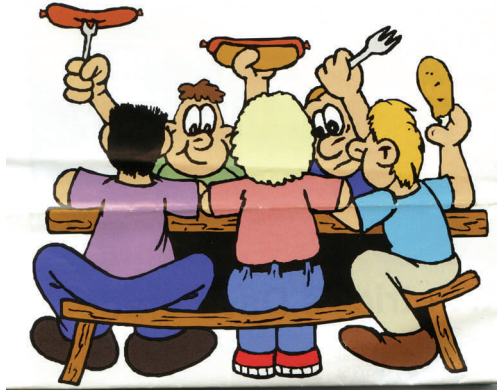
